### **Governor Voice**

Welcome to our new 'Governor Corner' where in each newsletter a different member of the governance team will write to you about the work that we do to support the school. This is because we know that it is really important that parents understand our role in the strategic direction of the school and how we work to champion the school but also offer challenge to ensure the best

outcomes for our children.

The first core function of school governors is to ensure clarity of vision, ethos and strategic

direction. This year, governors and senior leaders are working together to create a strategic plan for our school which incorporates our school vision and values. Once this is in place, our focus is to create a three-year strategy of priorities to ensure we achieve this vision.

Our second core function is to hold school leaders to account which we fulfil with a clearly organised structure and in a supportive manner. All our governors are responsible for a particular area to monitor, for example health and safety, attendance, or a curriculum area such as English. Each governor visits the school once per term to monitor their area along with the key member of school staff. Our visits are split into three sections: *Autumn* - where we consider the intent of the subject area, *Spring* - where we are taken on a walk of the school to see the subject being implemented and *Summer* - where we consider the impact of the actions during the academic year and how successful they have been. Currently, governors and staff are busy organising their first visits to school this academic year, and I hope we can inform you more about these as the year progresses.

The third core function is to oversee the financial performance of the school and make sure money is well spent. Following the appointment of our new School Business Manager, Pete Tilbury, we are working closely with him and Mrs Driver, to ensure we get the most from our money to provide the children the opportunities they need. As explained above, we have an individual governor responsible for monitoring the school finances, which they do monthly and a subgroup of governors meet at timely intervals with Pete to unpick and understand our finances in more detail. We use this finance information, what we find from our individual monitoring visits and the dialogue at meetings to support our decision making as a board.

We would like to invite parents to our first governor **coffee morning for parents and carers on**Wednesday 22nd November at 8:45am. We would like to speak to our parents and talk more about the role governors play in improving our school for all our children.

Hopefully, this new method of communicating will keep you more informed of the work we do as a board and bring current and appropriate topics to your attention. #### **Pupil Premium**

I have been part of the governing board at Burbage Infants for six years now and almost two at Burbage Juniors. With a background in education, our children's early learning experiences are something I feel very passionately about. I am proud to be part of both governing boards as we work together to ensure our children get the best possible experiences in their journey through EYFS, KS1 and KS2.

As well as being Chair of the board, I am also responsible for the monitoring of our pupil premium. Any child who qualifies for a free school meal, or has done in the last six years, brings an additional £1455 into the school fund which is to be focused on effective approaches to raise the children's

educational attainment. This includes children in the Infants, even though all children in Early Years and KS1 are entitled to a school lunch for free.

Miss Beighton is the lead member of staff who decides how this should best this money should be spent, along with Mrs Driver and it is my role to meet with her to find out what school are doing and how effective these approaches are. For example, this might be by being part of a small group for social and emotional skills or writing support or providing music tuition or access to an afterschool sports club.

### **Pupil Premium**

Pupil premium is a grant the school receives to provide extra support for children who are eligible either through being in receipt of free school meals, looked after (in care), fostered or adopted or has a parent in the forces. All children receive free school meals until they are 7 so you may not have applied previously. However, as the Free School Meals scheme ends when your child is 7 it is worth checking to see if you qualify.

It does not matter which year your child is in when you apply.

This year we will be offering a selection of support to those registered for pupil premium. This is reviewed at the end of each term.

- · Group or 1:1 intervention
- · Focused classroom support
- · CGP revision guides for year 6 children
- · One book per term from the BJS Top 100 Books
- · A contribution towards educational visits / external school visitors
- £100 per term towards music lessons or after school sports clubs
- · Free attendance to breakfast club email <a href="mailto:kidsspaceclubs@gmail.com">kidsspaceclubs@gmail.com</a> and state that your child is eligible for FSM.

It is at the school's and class teacher's discretion as to what support your child receives dependent on their needs. However, we do ask that if you have any concerns please speak to your class teacher in the first instance.

### Year Groups- Curriculum Update



#### Year 3 News

In year 3 we have been learning about the Stone Age and Prehistoric times, looking at evidence and reasons for change. We have linked this work to our English topics and even written instructions on how to wash a woolly mammoth which they have thoroughly enjoyed.

In maths ,the children have been working hard to develop their understanding of place value in 3-digit numbers and their addition and subtraction skills. They are starting to use more mathematical vocabulary to explain their thinking too- which is brilliant.

Children have enjoyed making sequences in dance using circle shapes and moving like silk. They have been very creative through this as well as through their sewing when they made cushions. Our next DT task will be to build a castle using 3D shapes which they are all very excited about.

Another engaging experience was when they tried different French food and created a firework picture for Bastille Day celebrations using chalk.

#### Year 4 News

Year Four has had a busy time. The children have been learning about internet safety in Computing and how to surf the internet safely – watching out for popups and phishing scams. We are now looking at search engines and how you can find out the weather in a different country or the percentage of an amount at the click of a button.

In Science, we have been exploring food chains and looking at how humans and climate change can impact the food chains around us. We have also had great fun building slingshot cars; we have learnt a lot about the importance of measuring and the need for tabs to build accurate cars.

Our English units have been about the great adventures of AJ the dog and Kian as they climb in the foothills of Everest. The children have written and performed play scripts as well as written a diary entry imagining they were climbing the mountain too. This has linked perfectly with our Geography topic on Mountains. The children have loved using atlases and researching all about mountain life.

We have had thoughtful discussions in RE about Christianity and we have looked at our rights and responsibilities in PSHE. This culminated in the class vote for school council representatives. Democracy in action!

In Maths, we continue to work on times tables and your support at home with this is much appreciated

### Year 5 News

The children have made a fantastic start to the year and have settled straight into Year 5. We have had a busy half term exploring the Amazon Rainforest, creating rainforest creatures and a rainforest menu that I would not fancy trying! Thankfully, the delights they made in Design and Technology were more successful. The children sampled different Bolognese sauces, before looking at the ingredients and nutritional value. They then designed their own recipe which they created. They all tasted delicious.

The children have been able to further develop their Design and Technology skills by creating a 3D pop-up book suitable for a Year 1 child. They are fantastic and it is clear how hard the children have worked on them. We are sure you will agree when they bring them home.

We have also had the opportunity to venture out into our local area and used this trip to gather information on the shops and facilities available to us in Burbage, to then design our own shop or business that could fill the gap in the market. We have had Gardening shops, Sweet shops and a

personal favourite, a Pokemon card trade shop! Keep your eye out in Burbage in case one suddenly appears.

In Science, the children have been looking at Forces. They have been comparing shoes to look at friction, designing the best sailboats to decrease water resistance and increase speed, and investigating paper spinners for air resistance. A very practical half term, which the children have thoroughly enjoyed.

We are looking forward to meeting you at parent's evening after half-term.

They have now completed their dance unit and first invasion games unit in PE.
